RIBBONS OFFERED PER CLASS

Rules:

1. Only animals owned, fitted, and shown by exhibitor in their individual classes are eligible to be shown in the Showmanship classes.
2. No bulls, boars or rams may be used in the showmanship classes.
3. Primary Showmanship will not compete in Round Robin Showmanship.
4. In the event an exhibitor has won first place in more than one division in showmanship: The exhibitor will choose which animal he/she will show in Round Robin Showmanship. The exhibitor must report their choice to the livestock Superintendent one hour after the last Showmanship class in the species they won. The second place winner in the "not chosen division" will be considered as an alternate in the Round Robin Showmanship, but will not be entitled to any special award that may be given to the first place Showmanship winner.

PRIMARY SHOWMANSHIP: Exhibitors must be in Younger member program, Kindergarten through 8 years old. Exhibitors may not go into Advanced Showmanship until they are 9 years of age.

NOVICE SHOWMANSHIP: Exhibitors in first year of project for each species of animal. FFA members who have shown the same specie in a 4-H project are not eligible to show in Novice Showmanship in that specie, but may enter the FFA Advanced Showmanship. The first award winner in each class may compete in the Advanced Showmanship Class but does not compete in Intermediate Showmanship.

INTERMEDIATE SHOWMANSHIP: Exhibitors who are in second and third year projects in Showmanship. First place winner may go to Advanced Showmanship.

ADVANCED SHOWMANSHIP: Exhibitors who are in fourth year and advanced projects. First place winners to compete in Round Robin Showmanship.
